Points on which information is queded as to provision for the welfare of children emigrating from the United Kingdom to Australia.

 - (d) Do the allowances provide for (i) clothing and (ii) pocket money?

 - (c) Does the organisation make use of such State services as may be svailable for guidance to juveniles and their placing in employment?
 - (d) What careers are most commonly chosen?
 - (e) What safeguards are employed in the selection of employers and what is the machinery of securing supervision over children when employed?

- (f) What are the arrangements for assisting them financially until they are self supporting?
- (g) Up to what ago does such assistance continue?

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- 5. 5. Are children encouraged to maintain contact with perents and other relatives, both in the United Kingdom and in Australia?
- 6. What is the general standing and reputation of the organisation, and of the staff and/or voluntary workers employed having regard to the number of children over whom supervision is required?
- What is regarded as the age on emigration at which 7. children are most likely to derive most benefit from emigration?

- What ere, in brief, the material standards of 8. occommodation, furnishings and equipment.
- What are the number, quelifications and suitability of the staff in relation to the number and sex of 9. the children occommodeted.
- (a) What is the disciplinary regime of the home and 10. the general home environment?
 - (b) Are the children afforded the opportunity for the development of individual interests and capacities?
 - (c) Are the children afforded the opportunity to form contacts with children living with their parents, and to become assimilated with the normal life of the community?
 - (d) What arrangements are made for holidays?
