

Former Child Migrants

Approximately 4,000 children were sent to Australia from Britain and Malta following World War Two.

The <u>records of Former Child Migrants</u> are spread across a number of different organisations, in Australia and overseas. Searching for and accessing these records can be complicated and time-consuming.

In 2018, the British government announced it would offer compensation to Former Child Migrants.

Child Migrants Trust

The <u>Child Migrants Trust</u> was established in 1987 by Margaret Humphreys. It is an independent, professional, specialised service for Former Child Migrants and their families. The Child Migrants Trust's services including searching for records, searching for family members, organising reunions and offering support and counselling. Through the Family Restoration Fund, it pays the cost of reunion travel for Former Child Migrants and their families. In Australia, the Child Migrants Trust has offices in Perth and in Melbourne.
